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Objectives of the course :	<p>The objective of this course is to broaden the perspective and understanding of the participants of differences in legal approaches to commerce and deepen their knowledge and insight of international influences, especially the law of the European Union, on company and corporation law.</p>
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Prerequisites :	<p>This course is intended for students from abroad as well as for regular students of the faculty. Therefore, this course will be given in English language. An active command of English is required.</p>
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Course contents :	<p>Students will first be familiarised with general principles of private international law especially the International and Inter-Regional Trade Law (international trade agreements – CISG - mainly WTO - Trade relations of the European Union with third countries.</p> <p>International Business Law is a body of legal rules, conventions, treaties, domestic legislation and commercial customs or usages, that governs international commercial or business transactions.</p> <p>The course consists of rules and standards related to international aviation, international shipping, international trade, international environmental law, human rights and humanitarian law, international conflicts</p> <p>International Business Law is an innovative, flexible programme designed for students to gain essential detailed knowledge of international trade and business from a legal perspective.</p>
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Evaluation :	<p>The course will be evaluated by a written paper (50%). There is a practical element to the course by way of presentations (50%).</p>
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Bibliography :	<p>Will be communicated at the beginning of the course</p>
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Remarks :	<p>Part of each session involves the solution of practical cases. Students will be encouraged to criticise constructively current laws and to suggest and evaluate possible reforms</p>
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Students will work on role play simulations of international organisations (WTO, European Union Concilium)
